Virtual Town Hall Follow -Ups

To meet their needs, we have worked with deans and department chairs throughout the development of the base schedule for graduate students and will continue working to address concerns that arise. Maraydgate programs polled their students to help determine the best instructional modalities for their students. We have given deans latitude to make celærgeschoelevel determinations about remote vs. SMUFlex delivery, including the red/blue strategy a needed, to support graduate student course instruction.

- Additional time between classes In response to a recommendation by the Academic Continuity subcommittee, and based on faculty requests and feedback from the Faculty Senate town hall, a-finieute increase to the time between classes has been approved. We are in the process of adjusting start/end times to provide a full class period for instruction. These changes to start/end times will extend to evening classes as well. Students who attend evergi classes, typically a large number of graduate students, will be notified of these time shifts once finalized so that they can make arrangements to accommodate work schedules and child care.
- Faculty preparation for online-only course delivery– A joint team from the Center for Teaching Excellence (CTE), Office of Information Technology (OIT), and Libraries, with input from SMU Global and Online (SMU GO), has developed two required courses (one focused on Canvas, one focused on online teaching)support faculty members in their delivery of highquality instruction through online modalities. As of Thursday, 149 of the over 300 faculty members exempted to teach remotely have finished the Canvas course, and 40 of those have finished both courses. An additional 145 faculty have voluntarily-selected to

- Standard syllabus language Prior to the beginning of each semester, the Office of the Provost sends a letter to faculty providing guidance on required languagof inclusion in course syllabi. Given the challenges we will be facing in fall 2020, you can anticipate additional language to include guidance on topics such as classroom attendance, participation and safety protocols related to instructional activities. Members of my office are currently developing a draft. Once drafting has been completed, we will work with deans, department chairs and the Faculty Senate to finalize and distribute to faculty before the beginning of the fall semester.
- SMU CAN and community "pledge to protect" As a first step to promote a safe return, the SMU Community Action Network (SMU CAN) has developed a community "pledge to protect" which has now been approved by the PEC. Prior to the start of the fall semester, all faculty, staff and students will review and sign the pledge to confirm our understanding and commitment to our personal responsibilities during these challenging times. This is not an effort to identify individuals who have not signed, but rather to understand the level of commitment in the different segments of our campus ommunity. This pledge is also included in the student return-to-campus training.
